## Simply Spring



To make this design you will need:

### Mechanics

2 x Containers  
Floral foam  
2 x kebab sticks  
14 x Midelino sticks  
Sticky tape

### Flowers /Foliage

A variety of foliage  
6 x Tulips  
1 x bunch of Freesia  
Few stems of Carnations

### Method:

1. Cut and soak the floral foam so it sits in the containers with about 1.5cm above the top.

2. Take 12 midelino sticks and tape at one end. Tape two midelino sticks at the same end and gently twist these around the grouped midelino sticks. Once you run out of the twisted ones, tie off with the tape and cut the ends off. Tape a kebab stick at each end of the midelino sticks.



3. Place the tied midelino sticks, one in each container.

4. Add foliage to each container, wrap trailing ivy around the midelino arch to bring the two designs together,



5. Add the flowers to each container, positioning so they lean into the midelino arch.

## Cheshire Area News

## Tulips

Tulips with their wide range of colours and varieties are a favourite Spring flower which have been used in flower arrangements for centuries.

The tulip was originally a wild flower growing in Central Asia and was first cultivated in Turkey in 1000 AD. The name tulip came from the Turkish word for Turban. The flowers were introduced into The Netherlands in the late 16th Century.

At the beginning of the 17th Century the tulip was starting to be used as a garden decoration instead of for medicinal purposes and soon gained popularity. "Tulipmania" reached a climax in The Netherlands in 1637 when the most sought-after bulbs cost the same amount as a magnificent house in Amsterdam.

Around the middle of the 19th Century the Tulip was so popular that many towns had a specialist society and the National Tulip Society was formed in 1849.

Botanists started to hybridize the flower and soon found ways of making even more decorative specimens. Tulips are divided into 15 different divisions mainly defined by the characteristics of their flowers. Some examples include Rembrandt, Parrot, Darwin and Lily-Flowered.

Tulip bulbs should be planted in the Autumn in a sunny spot with well-draining soil. Plant about five to seven inches deep and four to five inches apart with their pointy ends up. Water well and wait for Spring.
